Dr Phil Yates, Chair, South West Clinical Senate



Dr Phil Yates' has been a General Practitioner for 30 years. He was Chairman of two Primary Care Groups before becoming Professional Executive Committee Chairman of South Gloucestershire Primary Care Trust. He worked as National Clinical Advisor to the Modernisation Agency and has had a particular interest in renal medicine.

Dr Yates is a Director of 'GP Care', a primary care based organisation that seeks to remodel care across the primary / secondary care interface. He is on the Executive of the National Association of Primary Care, a governor of Primary Care Commissioning, cofounder of NHS Collaborate and Chair of the SW Clinical Senate.

Professor William R Roche, Chair, Wessex Clinical Senate

William Roche has been Professor of Pathology at University of Southampton since April 1997. In 2013 he was appointed Wessex Clinical Senate Chair by NHS England. In 2015, he was appointed as a Tribunal Chair by the Medical Practitioners Tribunal Service, the adjudication service for UK doctors who have been referred there by the General Medical Council. He is also Southern Regional Lead, Trustee and Revalidation Lead for the Faculty of Medical Leadership and Management.



Since 2016, he has been a senior appraiser for NHS England South. His previous roles include Medical Director of NHS South East Coast, the Strategic Health Authority for Kent, Sussex and Surrey, Medical Director and Deputy Chief Executive of Southampton University Hospitals NHS Trust, Interim Medical Director of Western Sussex Hospitals NHS Foundation Trust, Interim

Richard Jeavons, CEO, Independent Reconfiguration Panel



Richard is Chief Executive of the IRP, an expert non departmental body which advises the Secretary of State for Health about disputed NHS service. He is also Senior Partner at NHS Interim Management and Support (NHS IMAS), undertaking both consultancy and interim assignments for a variety of organisations across the NHS and the Department of Health.

Richard graduated from Edinburgh and York Universities before working as a health economist, initially in the NHS, but later at the Health Economics Consortium, University of York, where he became senior research fellow and deputy director.

He re-joined the NHS at the Northern General Hospital, Sheffield and became Director of Business Management. This was followed by being Chief Executive of Sheffield Children's Hospital Trust, Lincolnshire Health Authority, Sheffield Health Authority and West Yorkshire Strategic Health Authority.

In 2005, Richard joined the Department of Health (DH) to work on the National Programme for IT and related information policy, including the roles of Senior Responsible Owner for the NHS Summary Care Record and Information Governance Assurance Programme.

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Ben Clark, Assistant Director for Clinical Strategy, NHS England: North

Ben Clark is Assistant Director for Clinical Strategy in NHS England: North (Cumbria and the North East) and has covered the Northern England Clinical Senate Manager role on an interim basis for two years now. In his NHS England role he is responsible for the assurance process related to significant service reconfiguration and for the Clinical Senate has led the support for a number of independent clinical reviews, working to Prof Andrew Cant, Chair of the Northern England Clinical Senate. Prior to this Ben has worked in information management for two acute providers, was on the national team for the Coronary Heart Disease Networks, worked as Commissioning Policy and Service Improvement Lead for a Strategic Health Authority and was Head of Strategy and Planning for a PCT cluster.

Kevin Dixon, Chair, South West Citizens' Assembly

Kevin took over from Christine Teller as Chair of the Citizens' Assembly in February 2016. Kevin is also the Chair of Healthwatch Torbay. He became involved with health and social care as a family Carer and is particularly interested in how providers, patients and communities can work together to co-design and co-deliver services.



Ray Chalmers, Head of Communication and Strategic Engagement at South Devon and Torbay CCG

Ray Chalmers is Head of Communication and Strategic Engagement at South Devon and Torbay Clinical Commissioning Group, having previously worked in both mental health and acute hospital trusts. In his current role he was the communication and engagement lead for the CCG's reconfiguration of community services, now being implemented. Before joining the NHS in 2009, Ray had developed substantial business development and marketing communications skills through fulfilling several roles in professional services, consultancy, local government and journalism.



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Sue Trimmingham, Communications Specialist

Sue worked as a journalist in newspapers and radio before becoming Head of Communications for an NHS trust in Brighton and Hove. She helped the Trust deliver a wide range of new developments and amalgamations, some of which were controversial. Patient and public involvement in the work of the services was part of the role. Sue now has her own communications consultancy and also does voluntary work as a Board member for the Brighton YMCA.



Dr Mark Porter MBE

Mark Porter is the medical correspondent for The Times and one of the main health experts on the BBC. He has played a key role shows including flagship BBC health programme Watchdog Healthcheck and the Fighting Fat, Fighting Fit book, video and TV campaign.

Mark presents Case Notes on Radio 4 and fronts Five's daily live phone-in surgery and advice show, Doctor Doctor. He was also the resident doctor on Jeremy Vine's Radio 2 show. Mark writes columns for the London Evening Standard, Closer and Sainsbury's Magazine and was Health Editor at Radio Times for 10 years.



Despite these varied commitments Mark still works at his busy NHS practice in Stroud and enjoys hosting and lecturing at medical conferences. Mark qualified from Westminster Hospital Medical School, London and spent five years in a variety of hospital specialities before entering General Practice.

Hugh Alderwick, Senior Policy Adviser, King's Fund

Hugh Alderwick is Senior Policy Adviser to Chris Ham. Since joining the Fund in 2014, Hugh has published work on NHS reform, integrated care and population health, and opportunities for the NHS to improve value for money.

Before he joined the Fund, Hugh worked as a management consultant in PricewaterhouseCoopers' (PwC) health team. At PwC, Hugh provided research, analysis and support to a range of local and national organisations on projects focusing on strategy and policy.

Hugh was also seconded from PwC to work on Sir John Oldham's Independent Commission on whole-person care, which reported to the Labour Party at the beginning of 2014. The Commission looked at how health and care services can be more closely aligned to deliver integrated services meeting the whole of people's needs.
